



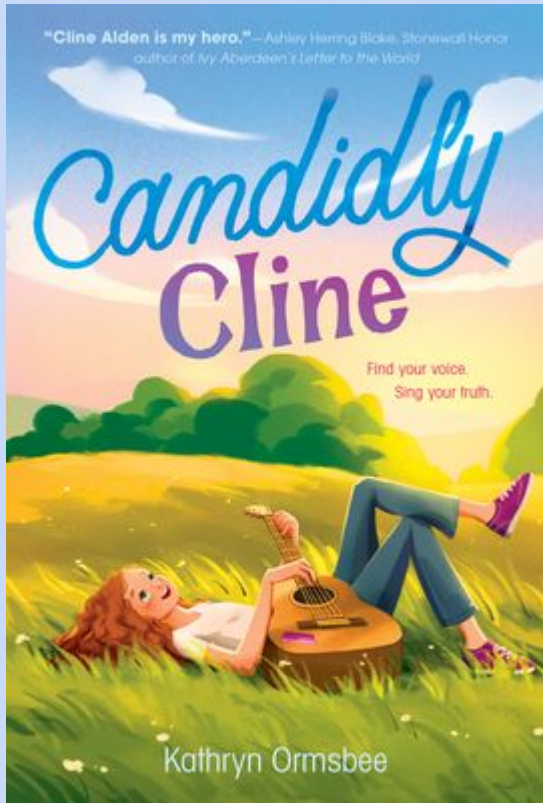

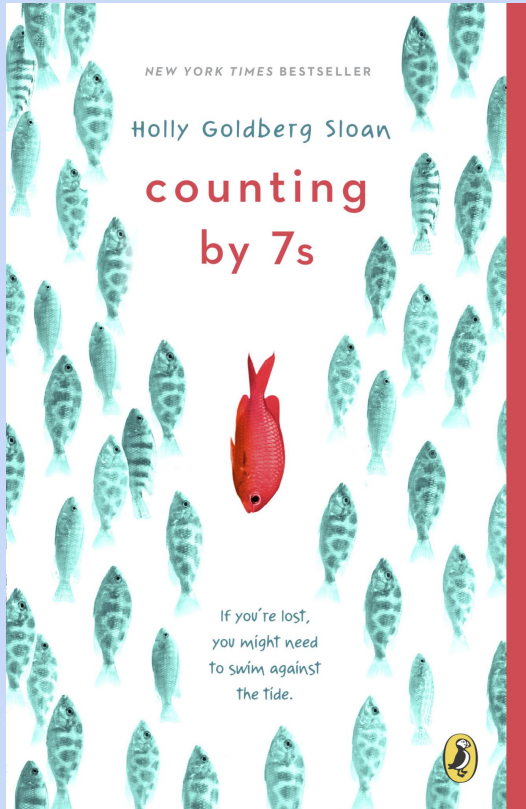

Counting by 7s by Holly Goldberg Sloan

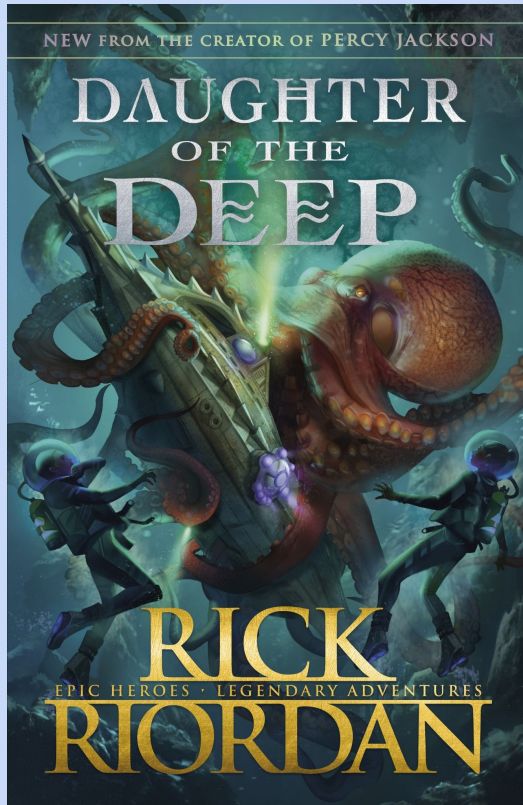


Twelve-year-old genius and outsider Willow Chance must figure out how to connect with other people and find a surrogate family for herself after her parents are killed in a car accident.

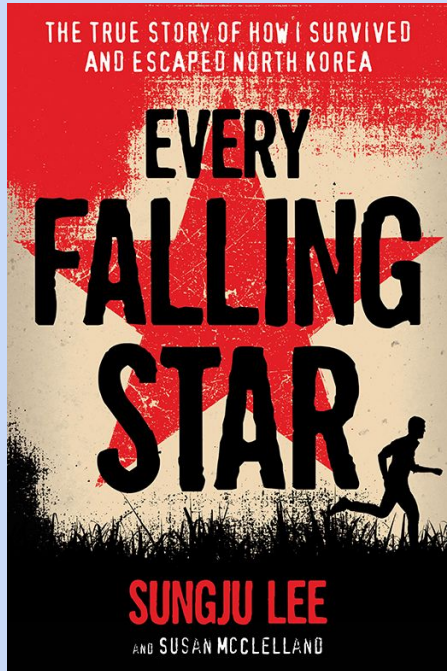

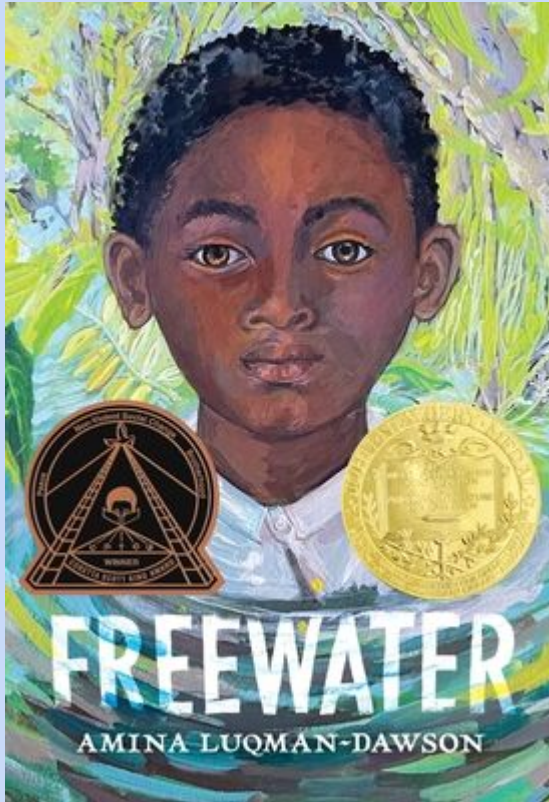
Every Falling Star: The True Story of How I Survived and Escaped North Korea by Sungju Lee & Susan Elizabeth McClelland

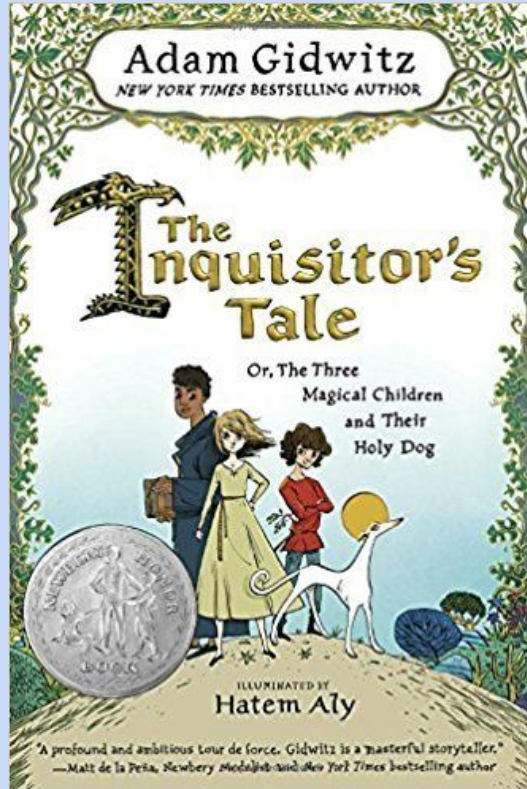
Freewater by Amina Luqman-Dawson

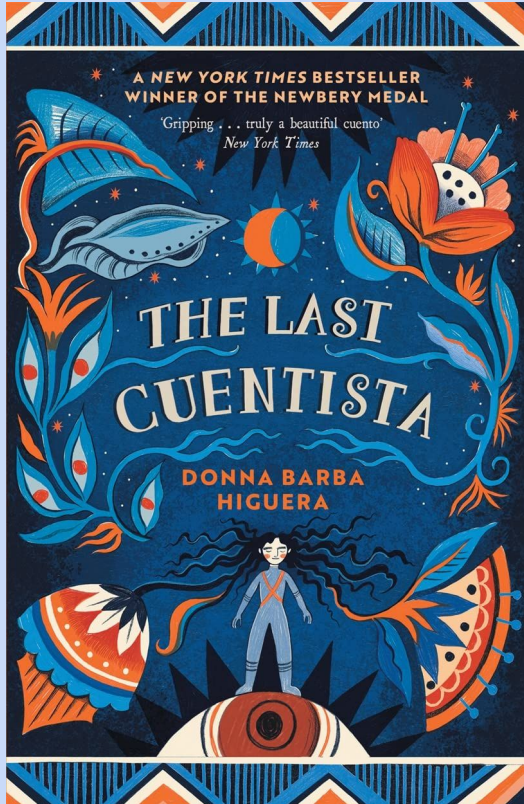


On a dark night in 1242, travelers from across France cross paths at an inn and begin to tell stories of three children and their adventures with history, religion, and farting dragons.

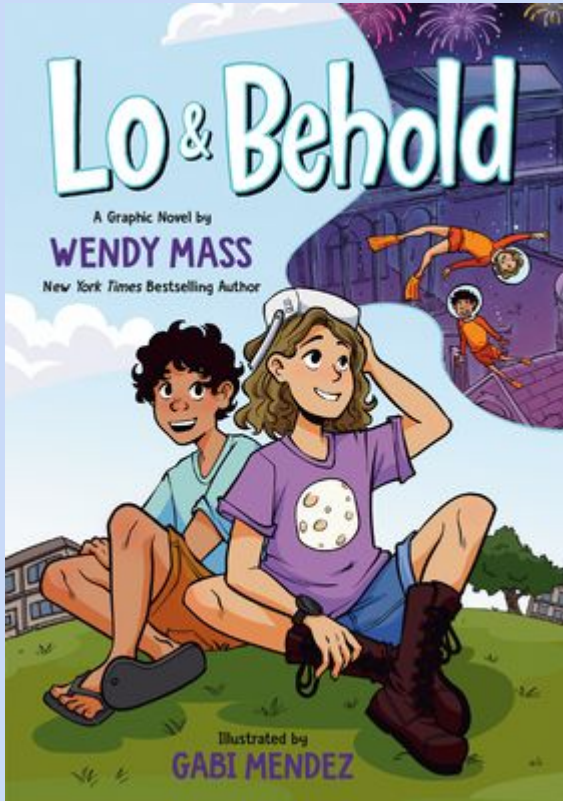

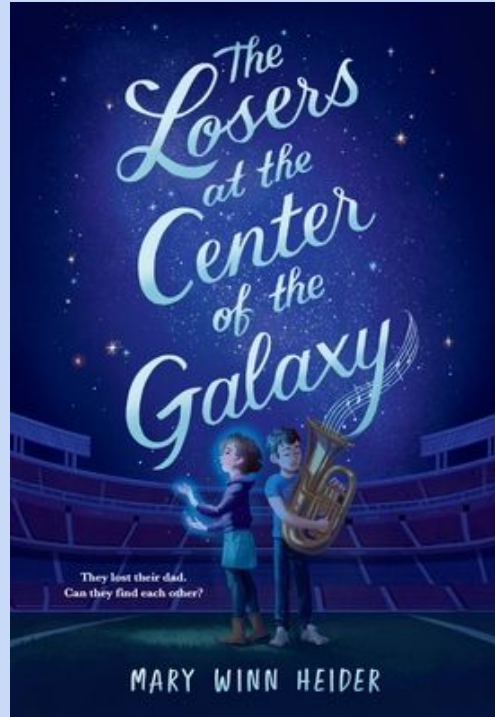

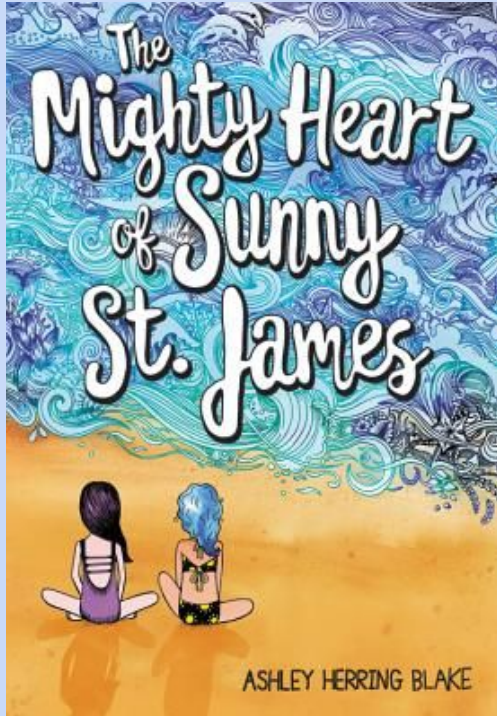

The Mighty Heart of Sunny St. James by Ashley Herring Blake

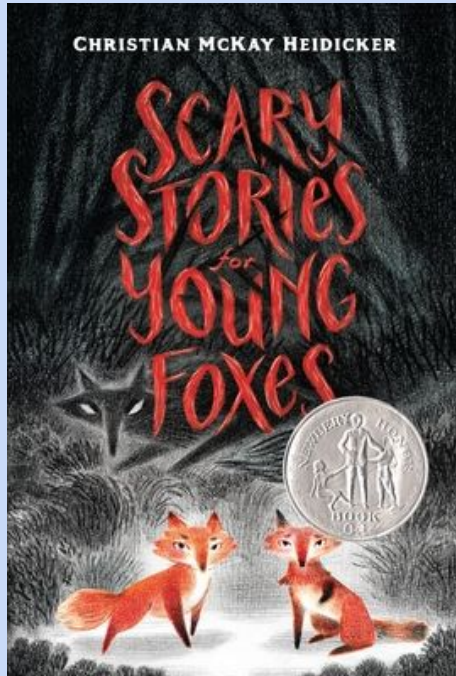

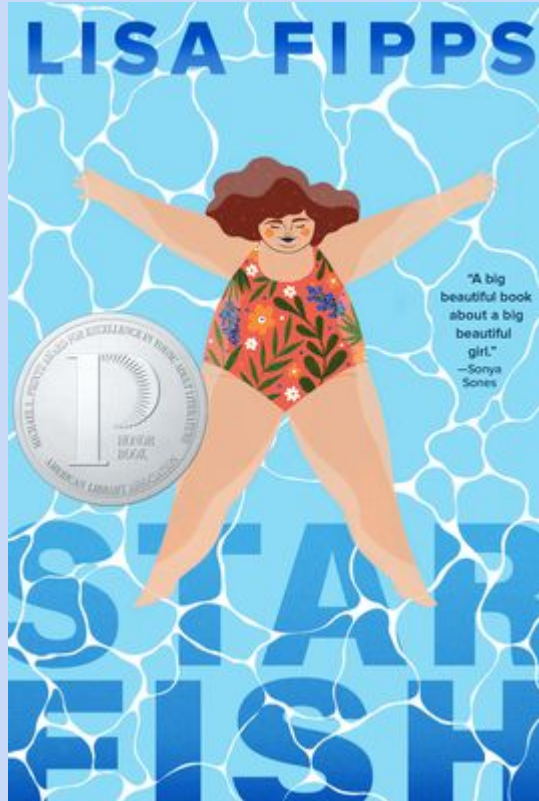
Scary Stories for Young Foxes by Christian McKay Heidicker

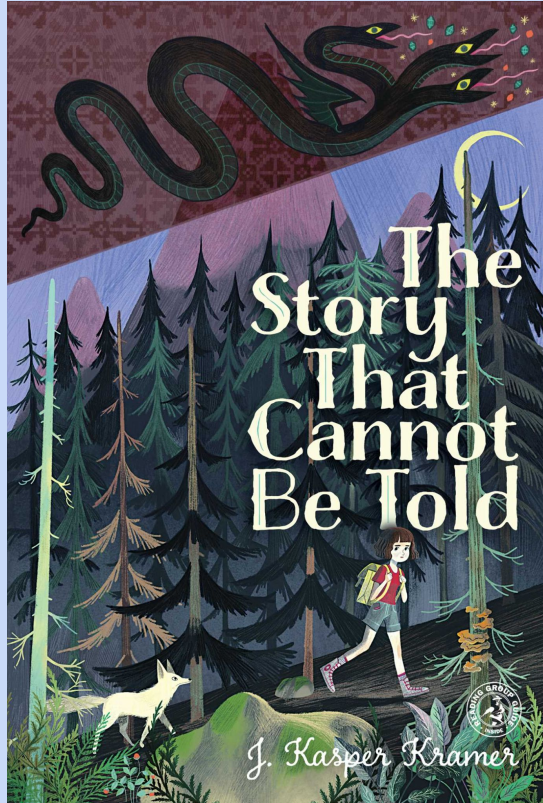
